Humorous and enlightening – the fascinating story of the echidna



There are few animals weirder than echidnas - a spiky egg-laying mammal that eats ants. But some of the weirdest things about echidnas are the things we don't know about. That they use their snout like a snorkel when they swim, that they can sense electromagnetic fields, that they have strangely complex brains, venomous glands and 'backwards' back feet. That they go into torpor when conditions are poor and they can survive fires underground. And during the mating season the males queue up after a female making cooing noises and forming an orderly echidna train, waiting their chance to impress her with some very strange reproductive equipment!

This book follows the echidna on its eclectic individual path, illustrated with quirky and characterful echidna sketches by the author. Danielle Clode is an award-winning author of Australian non-fiction books. Her books have won the Victorian Premier's Literary Award for Non-Fiction, the Federation of Australian Writers Award for Excellence in Non-Fiction, and two Whitley Awards. Danielle worked as a zookeeper before completing her doctorate in zoology at Oxford University, studying seabirds and feral mink in the Outer Hebrides of Scotland. She has been a freelance writer and researcher ever since and also teaches creative and academic writing across Australia.

Full Corset and Stockings

The History of Women's Cricket Craig Horne

Why did women's cricket completely disappear from public view in the 1950s, especially when the 1930s was considered to be 'the golden age' of the women's game? Why did it take until the last couple of decades for women's cricket to regain its pre-eminence in the minds of the sporting public?



These are the questions that *Full Corset and Stockings: The History of Women's Cricket* will attempt to answer by drawing on historic research, player profiles and stories, personal reflections and extensive interviews with both past and present players and officials.

Full Corset and Stockings details the history of women's cricket in England and the game's evolution as it moved to Australia, sharing the unknown stories of professional English and Australian players such as Emily Whatman (mother and childhood-trainer of men's cricket legend Don Bradman), left-arm bowler Peggy Antonio, and the author's own mother Nesta Williams. From the 1800s through to the Great Depression and the height of the women's game, to the re-emergence of women's cricket in the twenty-first century, Horne shines a light on the influential women of a historic Australian sport.

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Craig Horne has worked as a public servant, speech writer, archaeological surveyor, musician and author. He was the Communications Manager for Aboriginal Affairs Victoria for ten years and was a member of the Victorian Archaeological Survey in the 1970s, which inspired his latest historical work: Line of Blood: The Truth of Alfred Howitt (foreword by Bruce Pascoe). His career as a musician and singer over the last fifty years has driven the publication of a trilogy of music biographies, including Daddy Who?, Roots: How Melbourne Became the Music Capital of the World and I'll Be Gone: Mike Rudd, Spectrum and How One Song Captured a Generation.



Calendar is an essay collection in the form of a daybook, written in real-time over a year. The book takes inspiration from writers who use experiments and constraints, such as Georges Perec/Oulipo and Bernadette Mayer, as well as autobiographical writers who use inventive structures, such as Christina Sharpe in Ordinary Notes, and Sheila Heti in Alphabetical Diaries. Calendar is based on the French Republican calendar of the late 18th century, in which every day was dedicated to an object, and applies this concept to objects of contemporary life.

For a year Berry paid attention to her encounters with objects over the course of the day, and every night wrote an essay based on one object, and drew an illustration of

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it. Combining the narrative of a year and stories of the 365 objects themselves, *Calendar* is about tuning in to the unexpected, playful and solemn lives of the objects around us.

Vanessa Berry is a writer of autobiography and creative nonfiction, with interests in memory, history, place, archives and objects. She is the author of four books of autobiography and creative nonfiction, including most recently the essay collection *Gentle and Fierce* (2021), which considers human and animal relationships and urban space, and *Mirror Sydney* (2017) an essay and hand-drawn map collection which examines urban environments, change, and marginal and overlooked places.

Under the Influence of Salmon

How a Man and a Fish Turned the World Upside Down

Steve Harris

While Jules Verne was captivating the world with his fantastical tales of space travel and subterraneous adventure, the son of a preacher from the British Empire's most remote colony had a dream akin to man fishing on the moon.



James Youl wanted to turn the world upside down by transplanting salmon, and then trout, into the Southern Hemisphere for the first time. His mission was dismissed as scientific and ungodly madness, but over several decades of trial and tragedy it became the most audacious, romantic, and intensive wildlife feat the world has ever seen. His quest rewrote the laws of natural history and seeded today's enormous consumption of salmon, the worldwide reputation of fishing in Australian and New Zealand waters, the global boom in fish farming, and the still-unresolved questions of the relationship between nature and humankind.

Harris explores the history of salmon and, thus, the enduring colonial obsession with mastery over nature and enforcement of Eurocentric aesthetics in his latest historical work. Both a scientific and social commentary, Harris' work is bound to enthral readers the world over – just as salmon enthralled the minds of the English, Australians and New Zealanders in the early twentieth century in their quest to bring England to Australia.

Steve Harris is a former editor, editor-in-chief and publisher at *The Age, Sunday Age* and *Herald Sun.* He is the author of three non-fiction books, and in 2024 was awarded an Order of Australia (AM) for significant contributions to print journalism. He is a life member of Melbourne Press Club, and a John S. Knight Fellow at Stanford University.

A story of love, dreams, exile and tragedy, told with heartbreaking beauty



Ugo and Morena, with their young son Moreno, travel from Tuscany to Australia in the 1950s. Moreno grows up navigating two worlds – the Italian-speaking world of his parents, and the English-speaking world, with its strange Australian customs.

In the rural town of Mitrefò where they settle, an Italian cinema, café and bocce club soon appear. With his subtle eye for detail and playful use of language, Giovannoni captures the rhythms of daily life, the hard work of tobacco growing, the beauty of the landscape, and the bonds that form in the tight knit Italian community. Moving and lyrical, the book reveals the inner lives of Ugo, Morena and Moreno, with their secret hopes, fears and tangled feelings about their new life among 'the English'.

The story of Moreno and his family is punctuated by a series of vignettes – short stories of other Italian migrants whose journeys do not go to plan. Told through the

playful use of historical records, from police interviews to newspaper columns to medical reports, these stories bring to life voices that have otherwise been lost.

Moreno Giovannoni's writing has been compared with that of Boccaccio, Gabriel García Márquez and Italo Calvino, with 'its blend of the fantastic, the superstitious, the bawdy and the violent' (judges' report, Victorian Premier's Literary Awards), its tales 'salty, tangy, and rich' (Australian Book Review) and its 'complex home truths' (The Saturday Paper).

Moreno Giovannoni is the author of the critically acclaimed *The Fireflies of Autumn* and a freelance translator. His essay 'The Percheron' was selected for *The Best Australian Essays* in 2014. He was the inaugural winner of the Deborah Cass Prize for Writing in 2016.

Humans developed the scientific method over centuries. Its departure from what came before was that theories should be fuelled by data, not opinion. Today, the institutions that underpin democracy – the law, academia, government, journalism – all rely on its central idea: seeking facts and interrogating them through robust discussion and real-world testing. Yet in the post-truth era, public conversations can feel far from scientific.

In *Proof*, Elizabeth Finkel describes how the scientific method plays out in a series of controversies, from proving the existence of Einstein's gravitational waves to identifying the origins of Covid-19, from understanding human origins to defining consciousness. Through these tales of dispute and discovery, she breaks down the key elements of scientific thinking.

Full of politics, prejudice, obsession, heroism and eccentricity, *Proof* captures the drama and excitement of scientific discovery and debate and argues compellingly that its lessons are more crucial now than ever.

Elizabeth Finkel holds a PhD in biochemistry and spent ten years as a professional research scientist before becoming an award-winning journalist. She is a contributing editor to *Cosmos* magazine and also writes for the US magazine *Science*. Her numerous awards include a Queensland Premier's Literary Award for her book *Stem Cells: Controversy at the Frontiers of Science*. In 2011 she was named the National Press Club's Higher Education Journalist of the Year.

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
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Looking for Elizabeth

Why did Elizabeth Harrower – one of the most important authors of postwar Australia – stop writing at the height of her powers? After publishing four books that earned the admiration of Patrick White, Shirley Hazzard and Christina Stead, Harrower published no more novels. She faded from the literary landscape, until being rediscovered decades later to international acclaim.

In Looking for Elizabeth, Helen Trinca unravels this mystery. Exploring the personal and artistic forces that shaped Harrower's writing, she draws a sensitive portrait of a wounded 'divorced child' and the legacy of abandonment she carried throughout her life. She probes the contradictions of a woman who wielded extraordinary insight into others' lives but guarded her own fiercely. And she vividly brings to

life the literary circles of this fascinating era in Australian culture.

Based on private interviews with Harrower and full access to her archive, *Looking for Elizabeth* is the first full biography of this significant figure in Australian letters.

Helen Trinca's biography of Madeleine St John was co-winner of the Prime Minister's Prize for Non-Fiction in 2014. As a journalist, she has held senior positions at *The Australian*, including deputy editor, managing editor, European correspondent and editor of *The Weekend Australian Magazine*.

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
